Each day in August, **Jim Grover** photographed visitors to a bench in south London and learned how Covid had affected their lives. He says: "At the side of Mount Pond on Clapham Common there is a 24-hour, 365-days-a-year snack wagon called Honest Tom's. It was owned and operated by Tom, who passed away last year. In his memory, a bench has been erected nearby. Whoever sat down on Tom's bench became my subject for the day." Covid Tales from Tom's Bench is on display at the Omnibus theatre on Clapham Common.
